

### THE MOUNT VERNON COMMUNITY TRUST

To All Knox County Citizens:

Although this is the Annual Report of the Mount Vernon Community Trust for the year 1961, we would like to mention a gift in 1962 that is one of the most notable contributions from the Trust since its beginning. It is, of course, the gift to the City of Mount Vernon of a site for the new City Building on the northeast side of the Public Square, at a cost of approximately \$80,000. The success of this project was due to cooperative teamwork in which all concerned can take just pride. This includes, of course, members of Mount Vernon City Council, its Building Committee, and city officials. The people also deserving special thanks, however, are those who have made unrestricted gifts to the Community Trust for public charitable and welfare purposes. This gift to the City is only another expression of its interest in community betterment evidenced by the Trust ever since its founding in December, 1944.

We would like to stress the fact that although the Trust is named The Mount Vernon Community Trust, it is truly a Knox County organization which disburses funds to county groups such as the Knox County Heart Association and the Knox County Cancer Society, and receives contributions on a county-wide basis. Every citizen of Knox County is, in fact, a beneficiary of the Trust. This includes all children and adults who are served by the Bookmobile and the Public Library — the former having been financed from the income of the Trust and the latter made possible by its capital gift of \$75,000. A citizen is also a beneficiary who uses the facilities of the Y.M.C.A., The Mount Vernon Community Swimming Pool, Salvation Army, Mercy Hospital, Kenyon College, Memorial Hospital and the other educational, health and benevolent institutions which, through the years. have been and continue to be helped by the Community Trust.

The Trust has achieved greater recognition, support and appreciation each year of its existence. Starting in 1944, a

principal of \$129,304.66 was built up through 1945. On December 31, 1961, as you will note further back in this report, total principal and retained earnings amounted to \$358,709.09.

There are several facts of great significance and a source of lasting satisfaction to all Community Trust donors. For example, there is complete assurance that donors' bequests will always be used as they themselves most desire. Secondly, the capable management of such funds not only helps assure continuing and most favorable earnings on principal, thus to perpetuate benefits, but also makes certain that disbursements always will be made most appropriately -- when and where they will do the most good. Finally, philanthropy is simply an act of good citizenship. The Community Trust offers each man and woman an opportunity to be of help or to say "thanks" in a lasting way in his or her own right and in accordance with his or her means. If you are not already a donor, think of these things.

To become a donor to the Trust, you may make a gift of any amount, whether large or small. The Trust officers of the Trustee Bank (The First-Knox National Bank), any member of the Distribution Committee or its Secretary will gladly discuss with a prospective donor his wishes as to the use of his gift, restricted or unrestricted as the case may be. All gifts are deductible for Federal income tax purposes.

Gifts are not limited to causes within the boundaries of Knox County, but can be channelled through The Mount Vernon Community Trust to public educational and philanthropic agencies located anywhere in the world.

This 17th Annual Report to you, the citizens of Knox County, shows how the idea of nine Mount Vernon citizens has blossomed and grown into an organization serving the needs of all of the people of Knox County and even the world at large.
