

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To the people of Knox County and the founders and donors of The Mount Vernon Community Trust:

Here is your copy of the 18th Annual Report covering in some detail the operations in 1962 of your Community Trust.

1962: Most notable year

We believe you will take pride in the actions of the Trust last year because they will likely be remembered as the most notable since its founding, December, 1944.

Facts and figures

New Gifts to Principal, amounting to \$39,768.75 and Disbursements of \$62,292.00, were well above the average in previous years, while Income from Investments was naturally at record level, as was also the total Disbursements of \$653,912.86 from the Trust since its beginning in 1944.

Site for City Hall

The gift to the people of Mount Vernon in June of last year of a suitable site for the new City Building demonstrated the benevolent purposes of the Trust and broadened its circle of donors and friends in the community. The handsome colonial type building on its \$80,000 site at the northeast section of the Public Square, is expected to be occupied by the various departments of our City Government before the end of this year.

House and lot for Fire Department

With the help of a few public spirited friends of the Trust, its Trustee, The First-Knox National Bank, acquired title to the former Ekleberry building at 207 W. Ohio Avenue, and the land on which it stands. This property, which has been approved by City officials and Council for use of the Fire Department, has been deeded to the City Government of the people of Mount Vernon.

Funds needed for Student Loans

The 17 Scholarship Loans totaling \$16,500.00 indicate an activity of your Trust in which you can take just pride. The fact that applicants for this financial assistance prefer loans to outright gifts shows the serious minded attitude of these gifted but needy young people, determined to complete their higher education.

While these loans are made with promise of repayment, our severe shortage of unrestricted funds makes it impossible to meet the demand for loans of this kind. Without apology, therefore, we ask you to consider establishing a fund in the name of yourself, a relative or friend, the income or principal of which would be used for scholarship loans. Is there a simpler way than this to provide for you a certain immortality in the years that lie ahead?

Gift from C-B Charities Fund

Another event of historic importance, which occurred last year, was the gift of \$500.00 from the Cooper-Bessemer Employees Charities Fund. Being unrestricted, it was especially useful in helping to meet the demand for student loans. The members of the committee in charge of the fund, who are elected by vote of employees, graciously promised to consider again this year our request for a gift to the Trust.

Old Library lot to hospital

As already announced through local news media, our bid of \$10,000.00 for the ground on which the former public library stands was accepted and the deed for the property has been turned over to The Bert W. Martin Memorial Hospital. This action in effect increased the pledge of the Trust to the hospital from \$15,000.00 to \$25,000.00.

All need joy of giving and lasting memorial

One only needs to look around to see that our people are on their way to better days in this community. Your Trust is willing and, with your help, will be able to assist in achieving worthy goals.
