THE MOUNT VERNON COMMUNITY TRUST

Annual Report for 1964

Dear Fellow Citizens of Knox County:

The scene on the cover of this 20th Annual Report of your Community Trust signifies the broad area of city, town and country wherein all people benefit by the Trust and to whom the trust looks primarily for support of its continuing good work.

Beyond this, what should our Community Trust mean to us? First, there are today about 200 similar community foundations throughout the land. However, the vast majority of these is to be found in much larger communities in and about the biggest cities. So we are fortunate indeed to enjoy all the benefits of an active, philanthropic foundation just as do the citizens in the many, many far more populous areas. And this is one of the things that sets our community apart from others of like size everywhere — makes it a better place to live, to work, and to raise our families.

As evidenced by our previous reports and data on the following pages, the financial strength of our Trust lies in the union of many gifts, large, small and in between. It offers our citizens of varied means equal opportunity to establish "living trusts" for charitable purposes, in a most meaningful, gratifying manner.

A fund of any size may be created by will, trust agreement, life insurance, or other transfer of property. The specific use of such a fund, or the income derived from it, may be stipulated by the donor or left to the judgment of the Distribution Committee.

In any case, each fund shares with all others the economy and effectiveness of joint, expert management, to perpetuate and derive the fullest possible usefulness from these "living trusts." A donor, whether his gift is large or small, gains lasting satisfaction from the assurance that he is extending a hand to his fellow citizens and that there is no other way in which his own fund could be more wisely administered.

During 1964

Fortunately, the Community Trust now has largely discharged the sizeable financial obligations it assumed in behalf of the Martin Memorial Hospital and the new Municipal buildings — major 1963 disbursements. In a manner of speaking, this has enabled the Trust to "catch its breath" during 1964, to recover some of the financial position lost during 1963, and to lend support to other and equally deserving or important activities.

For example, during 1964, eight different disbursements to the Y.M.C.A. Building Fund totalled almost \$24,000.

Specifically, as you will see, new gifts to our Community Trust principal amounted to \$78,964.91 during the year — almost 31% more than in 1963. At the same time, disbursements and notes payable totalled \$34,471.90 less than in 1963. So, with gifts up and disbursements down, our 1964 year-end balance was \$25,505.22 greater than in 1963.

However, the above improvement in year-end balance compared with 1963 is not as encouraging as it may seem. The fact remains that total disbursements and notes payable greatly exceeded new principal — by \$56,491.92. Therefore, our Mount


Vernon Community Trust is very much in need of new assets in order to grow and continue serving our community in proportion to our area progress and needs.
