

Forward

This is the 25th Annual Report of the Mount Vernon Community Trust, a benevolent enterprise established December 18, 1944 by a group of citizens under the leadership of the late Beatty B. Williams whose continuing interest, influence and financial support over the years until his death in late 1969 contributed much to its progress.

The 25th year of operation saw the greatest growth in principal in any year to date, with the unexpended balance reaching a record \$893,364.45 at the end of 1969.

A brief review of the 25 year history of the Trust may be of interest.

The Resolution and Declaration of Trust was written by Charles M. Zelkowitz, Attorney-at-Law. It has been favorably recognized for its brevity and clarity. Under its terms Trustee Banks agreed to accept gifts, devises and bequests for public educational, charitable or benevolent uses and purposes, in trust, to be invested for safety of principal and income until used. It further provided that distribution of funds shall be made in accordance with wishes of donors and under the direction of a committee selected for its interest in public educational, charitable or benevolent needs.

The members of the original Distribution Committee were: Beatty B. Williams, Chairman of the Board of The Cooper-Bessemer Corporation who was elected Chairman of the Committee and served until his retirement in 1965; Clyde G. Conley, President of the Mount Vernon Bridge Company, Bert W. Martin, President, The Shellmar Products Corporation, Thomas McDowell of the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company and John W. Rudin, President, The Rudin Company. Charles M. Zelkowitz was elected Secretary of the Committee and has faithfully served in this capacity since 1944. Others who have served on the Committee when vacancies occurred were E. L. Miller, J. Gordon Bone and O. W. Stanley.

Over the 25 years of operation an aggregate total of slightly more than two million dollars in cash, securities and other property has been donated to the Trust by individuals, corporations and through bequests under Wills. The largest total came in 1969, the 25th year, when \$546,925.13 was received.

Of this amount \$363,600.76 came as bequests from estates under the Wills of James H., Cora D. and Jennie J. Debes and Adah Wolfe. A review of gifts over the years reveals that Beatty B. Williams donated to the Trust every year except two. His total aggregate giving over the 25 year period amounted to approximately one-half million dollars. He also left a bequest in his Will to the Trust.

Earnings from dividends and interest on investments and profits on securities sold have amounted to approximately \$360,000.00. Disbursements as directed by the Distribution Committee and in accordance with wishes of donors approached one and a half million dollars during the 25 year period.

Some of the major projects in the area that have received substantial financial support from the Trust are: Mount Vernon Public Library Building, Mercy Hospital Expansion, Salvation Army Building, Girl Scouts Building, Community Park Swimming Pool, St. Vincent de Paul School, Bert W. Martin Memorial Hospital, City Hall Building Site, West Ohio Ave. Fire Department Building, Y.M.C.A. Building, Knox County Airport, Mount Vernon Nazarene College Site and Kenyon College Expansion. Funds disbursed for these and some sixty or more other smaller projects and causes came from designated and unrestricted gifts and outright grants from income and profits on investment under the direction of the Distribution Committee.

The financial support given by the Trust to the many public educational charitable or benevolent causes over the 25 years of its existance was only made possible by the generosity of individuals, firms and corporations through their gifts to the Trust.

New contributions are always needed in order for the Trust to grow and continue to serve effectively. Outright gifts may be made during lifetime as well as gifts under Wills.

Members of the Distribution Committee and the Trustee bank welcome your questions and assure careful attention to your favorable consideration of a gift to The Mount Vernon Community Trust.



THE MOUNT VERNON COMMUNITY TRUST

What it is

Since the Cleveland Foundation was established in 1914, many such charitable trusts have proven their value in communities throughout the country. The plan is attractive to donors since gifts of property, such as stocks and bonds, are accepted at full market value on date of transfer free of any capital gains or federal income taxes. The plan is flexible so that a donor can be certain his fund will be used effectively, even though conditions change. If a cause or purpose selected by the donor becomes obsolete, ceases to exist, merges with others, or no longer requires financial aid, the fund is then used for the support of activities in a field similiar to the one mentioned by the donor.

How it works

These gifts are in the keeping of the Trustee Bank, (The First-Knox National Bank), which invests them for safety of principal and income and certifies quarterly to the Distribution Committee the amount available for distribution as directed by the donors. In the absence of such direction, the amounts available are disbursed at the discretion of the Committee in accordance with the purpose of the Trust.

Why it works . . .

It is a fund made up of numerous gifts placed with the Trustee at different times by individuals, families, corporations, and service groups to serve permanently the educational, charitable, health, and welfare needs of the community.

Who it works for

It works for the donor by safe-guarding the principal and disbursing the income of this gift long after his decease and by winning for him a certain immortality in the memory of friends, neighbors, and specific beneficiaries.

It works for the people of the community, all of whom are benefited by gifts for civic improvements.

Gifts can be channeled through the Trust to educational, charitable, and benevolent organizations not only throughout the United States but anywhere in the world.

Suggested forms of bequest to the Mount Vernon Community Trust

Property of any kind may be given to any bank or trust company, having fiduciary powers, in trust for The Mount Vernon Community Trust. The following forms of bequest are suggested:

Bequest for General Purposes I give and bequeath to (name of bank) in trust for The Mount Vernon Community Trust, the sum of Dollars (\$......) for the purposes and upon conditions named in that certain Resolution and Declaration of Trust of December 18, 1944, creating The Mount Vernon Community Trust, recorded in Vol. 1, at Pages 521-530 of the Miscellaneous Records of the Recorder of Knox County, Ohio. Bequest for Specific Purposes Add to the above: Provided, however, that the net income therefrom (or principal) shall be devoted to the support of (name of particular charitable institution or object) until such time as The Mount Vernon Community Trust may otherwise direct in the manner provided in the said Resolution and Declaration of Trust. Memorial Bequest Add to the above: It is my desire that the foregoing gift be known as the MEMORIAL FUND.



Beatty B. Williams

August 22, 1876 — December 29, 1969

Beatty B. Williams was born in Shelby, Ohio, August 22, 1876, son of Benjamin and Ida Williams. His elder sister, Lucia, used to insist that he had only been born to be hung, because he had been such an inveterate hell-raiser in his early years. Fortunately, in high school, he came under the influence of a teacher of exceptional skill; and under her guidance, he began to develop into the able and compassionate human being he was to become. He obtained his early business experience delivering newspapers and groceries and clerking in a shoe store in Shelby. The pattern his life was to follow was forged at Oberlin College, from which he graduated with an A. B. degree in 1899.

October 24, 1900, he married Amy Fairchild, only daughter of Frank L. Fairchild who was then president of The C. & G. Cooper Co. of Mount Vernon, Ohio.

After two years of employment with The Shelby Steel Tube Co., Mr. Williams came to Mount Vernon, Ohio and became sales engineer of The C. & G. Cooper Co. in 1901. This was the beginning of a business and community relationship that was to last throughout his life.

His career with Cooper Industries may be summarized as follows: 1901 - Salesman: 1908, Sales Manager; 1912, Secretary; 1916, Vice President & General Manager; 1920, President & General Manager; 1935, Chairman of the Board; 1940, reelected after the sudden death of Mr. C. B. Jahnke; 1943-1956 Chairman of the Board; 1956, Honorary Chairman; 1959, retired.

His civic interests began with the First Congregational Church where, among other offices, he served as superintendent of the Sunday School for the first nineteen yeras of his married life. He was a deeply religious man who had the courage to believe that God is love, and to lead his whole life in the light of that faith. He was enthusiastic about the Y.M.C.A. movement; and his enthusiasm raised the money for the first Y.M.C.A. building in Mount Vernon in 1908. In addition to serving for more than thirty years on the Board of Trustees of the local Y.M.C.A. Mr. Williams was elected to membership on the Area Council, and later became a member of the Board of the National and International Council of Y.M.C.A.s. He was delegate to the World Conference of the Y.M.C.A. held at Helsingfors, Findland in 1926, and served with distinction as President of the National Council of Y.M.C.A.s in 1935-1936. He lived to become the largest single donor to the new Y.M.C.A. building, erected in Mount Vernon in 1966.

He was generous with both time and money in support of almost every worthwhile project carried out in Mount Vernon during the first sixty-nine years of the Twentieth Century. Among some of the more visible of these projects (in addition to the new Y.M.C.A. building) are the present Post Office, for which he and Ralph Ringwalt raised \$50,000; the present Public Library, to which he and Ralph Ringwalt and Bert W. Martin each contributed \$25,000.00; the New City Hall, whose location was made possible by the purchase of land by the Mount Vernon Community Trust; the Bert W. Martin Memorial Hospital to which, after Bert Martin, he became the largest individual contributor.

His experience at Oberlin engendered a life-long interest in higher education which inspired him to serve as trustee of Oberlin College for twenty-five years, from 1926 to 1951, and as honorary trustee from 1951 to his death. During his tenure as trustee, and by the terms of his will, he became recognized as one of Oberlin's most generous alumni.

His father, B. J. Williams, had served for thirty years as president of The First National Bank of Shelby, Ohio; and the son sustained the family interest in Banking by serving as a director of The First-Knox National Bank of Mount Vernon for forty-one years, from 1919 to 1960. He acted as Chairman of the Board for fifteen years, from 1945 to 1960; and it was during this period that the present Bank building was erected on the Public Square.

He was instrumental in forming The Mount Vernon Community Trust in 1944 and served as a member of its Distribution Committee until his terminal illness. It was his conviction that The Mount Vernon Community Trust would ultimately become the most beneficial of all the

benevolent enterprises in which he had engaged.

Following the death of his first wife in 1952, Mr. Williams married Edith McCleod Hindley, widow of Reverend J. G. Hindley, on November 14, 1953. They continued to live at the Fairchild-Williams family homestead known as Maplehurst at 501 E. Gambier St. until Mr. Williams' death, which took place in The Bert W. Martin Memorial Hospital at noon on December 29, 1969.

Mr. Williams is survived by his wife, Edith Hindley Williams, now in Aurora, Illinois; a son, Lawrence F. Williams of Mount Dora, Fla.; a grandson, Bradford H. Williams of Palm Beach, Fla.; two great grandchildren; and a brother, Whiting Williams of Cleveland, Ohio. There are also two step-sons, a step-daughter and nine step-grandchildren.
