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### Mission Statement

The Mount Vernon Community Trust, having been created to receive and accept property and contributions to be administered for charitable purposes benefiting Mount Vernon and Knox County, Ohio, shall be operated so as to fulfill the following mission:

Improving the quality of life in Mount Vernon and Knox County through charitable giving.

Providing a vehicle for donors with varied interests to support charitable and community activities.

Assessing and responding to emerging and changing community needs in the fields of education, youth services, recreation, arts and culture, social services, and civic and community development.

Developing a permanent endowment for the community.

Serving as a catalyst to initiate projects vital to the community.

### Year in Review


As we complete the 48th year of the Mount Vernon Community Trust, we are pleased to report the Trust continues to grow and, more importantly, continues to make a substantial contribution to the quality of life in Mount Vernon and Knox County.

The Community Trust is a charitable foundation that provides a permanent endowment for our community. The Trust was designed as an organization that would ensure the perpetual usefulness and recognition of charitable gifts.

The Trust was created by and for people who wanted to give back to their community. Our donors, who come from all over Mount Vernon and Knox County, have asked the Trust to manage their charitable assets. In return, we provide permanent stewardship, efficient administration, and the opportunity for donors to receive continuing recognition of their contribution to their community.

The Community Trust does not have annual fund raising campaigns. We do not actively solicit funds. The purpose of the Trust is to provide a tax-exempt vehicle for individuals and organizations to make gifts or bequests to benefit a specific charity or the community on a permanent and continuing basis.

The growth of the Trust in the past year again reflects the importance of experienced and competent administration by our Trustee and the continued confidence of donors in the value of the work of the Distribution Committee.



New gifts and bequests totaled \$115,499. The year-end book value of total assets of the Trust increased 3% to \$8,052,427. The actual market value was \$10,102,752, an increase of 3%.

Grants in 1992 totaled \$487,702 of which \$269,204 were distributed from the Designated Funds, while \$201,379 were distributed from Unrestricted Funds. The balance of \$17,119 was paid from donor-advised funds.

Grants from Designated Funds are specified by the Donor and are distributed to a very large number of charitable institutions. Grants from Unrestricted Funds are determined by the Distribution Committee. Unrestricted Funds truly serve as an endowment for the community because these grants are limited to recipients in Knox County. Further, these grants can react to unexpected needs in the community and to new or emerging programs to benefit the community at large. A complete list of all grants is reported in the statistical section of this report.

Occasionally the Trust provides support services to major fund raising campaigns. While we serve entirely in an advisory position, our objective is to ensure the success of all valuable community projects.

In our effort to encourage public support for an approved project, the Trust frequently issues challenge grants. This past year, the Trust approved the plans for a substantial expansion of the local Salva-

tion Army facilities. The Trust challenged the Salvation Army Campaign Committee to raise \$600,000 in order for them to receive a \$100,000 grant from the Trust. While the Campaign was not completed in 1992, it has met the challenge goal and will receive our grant.

Grants from our Unrestricted Funds are selected by the Distribution Committee and respond to community needs in the following fields; Education, Youth Services, Arts and Culture, Social Services, and Community Development.

The Trust continues as a major source of financial aid for Knox County students. Scholarship grants totaling \$185,919 were provided for 134 students attending 56 different colleges. The scholarship funds of the Trust have

indeed been a blessing to students and parents as the cost of education has skyrocketed, while the need for higher education has never been greater.

A 4-H Youth Center was a dream fulfilled when brother and sister, Richard and Arline Landers, donated a large building to the 4-H organization to establish a Center for the youth of Knox County. To convert the building to adequately serve the needs of the Center, the Community Trust contributed \$40,000 for renovations and equipment. The facility at 401 West High Street in Mount Vernon has been serving over 2,000 members of the 4-H.

Working with individuals or community organizations is an important responsibility of the Distribution Committee. We seek to encourage and work with others in the important task of enhancing the quality of life in Mount Vernon and Knox County.

Over the years, the Trust has provided over \$400,000 for the development of athletic and recreational facilities for schools in Mount Vernon, Centerburg, Danville, East Knox, and Fredericktown. In addition, we have assisted the City of Mount Vernon to develop their outstanding recreation facility at Memorial Park. This year, the Trust provided a grant for the development of two additional ball fields.


The Community Trust played a key role in the original development of the Knox County Airport. Continued support has provided expanded facilities and many improvements to the airport. This past year, funds were provided for new hangar space and runway improvements.

Through a grant from the Trust, additional acreage adjacent to the Knox County Historical Museum was acquired for future expansion of the Museum.


Contributions to the Trust in the form of gifts

Income is distributed for local purposes and projects where the needs are the greatest as determined by the Distribution Committee.

# Scholarship Grants . . . \$185,919

Grants for scholarships are made from three categories of funds: Unrestricted, Designated, and Donor Advised. The Trust has appointed an independent Scholarship Selection Committee to evaluate and select candidates for scholarship awards. The Selection Committee is composed of three members, one each from Kenyon College and the Mount Vernon Nazarene College, and a high school in Knox County.

The Trust distributed 134 grants totaling \$185,919 during the past year.

### An Endowment for All

What is the Community Trust?

The Trust is a community foundation—a nonprofit organization that supports charitable endeavors and worthy projects within a particular geographical area. In the case of the Trust, that area embraces all of Knox County, Ohio. Founded in 1944, the Trust has assets of more than \$7 million. These funds, donated by many individuals and families over the years, function as a community endowment—the principal is invested and protected; only the income is used.

### What is the mission of the Trust?

The Trust seeks, broadly, to improve the quality of life in Knox County. It does this by giving grants to support projects in fields such as education, health, recreation, community planning and development, social services, culture, and the arts.

### How does the Trust work?

A Distribution Committee consisting of five Knox County residents oversees the disbursement of grants. The Committee ensures that funds are used in accordance with the wishes of donors. In the case of "unrestricted" funds—those for which donors did not specify a purpose, the Committee makes grants based on community needs. Thus, the Trust functions in two ways: it serves as a vehicle through which donors can support the charitable causes of their choice and, it serves as a permanent, general endowment for Mount Vernon and Knox County.

What kinds of grants does the Trust give?

The Trust administers a substantial college scholarship program. Other grants support building funds, capital campaigns, and equipment purchases. The Trust also provides matching or challenge grants as well as seed money for charitable groups. Annual contributions are made to specific charities from funds designated by donors for that purpose. Occasionally, the Trust also coordinates fundraising drives for special community projects.

Who benefits from the Trust?

Dozens of community organizations have received support from the Trust. They include: the YMCA, the Public Library

of Mount Vernon and Knox County, the city and county school systems, various recreational facilities in the county, the City of Mount Vernon, Moundbuilders Guidance Center, Station Break Senior Citizens' Center, Salvation Army, Interchurch Social Services, Hospice of Knox County, Knox County Airport, Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Kenyon College, Mount Vernon Nazarene College, Memorial Building Theater, Knox County Agricultural Museum, and the Knox County Historical Museum. Through its grants to organizations like these, and through its scholarship program, the Community Trust touches the lives of thousands of residents throughout Knox County.

Why do people give to the Trust?

The Trust offers people an opportunity to contribute to the well-being of their community. Moreover, in giving through the Trust, donors know that their gifts will benefit future generations, because the Trust spends only the income from its investments. The original gifts are safeguarded. A gift to the Trust is thus a way of perpetuating one's own memory in the community or provides a lasting memorial for someone else.

How does somebody make a gift to the Trust?

Many donors include a bequest to the Trust in their wills, while some make contributions during their lifetime. Gifts can take the form of securities, real property, or other assets as well as cash. Donors may make designated gifts, specifying that the money benefit a particular organization or field of interest; or unrestricted gifts, which are used to meet a wide variety of community needs.

What are the practical advantages of giving to the Trust?

The Trust professionally and prudently manages all gifts, with the goal of ensuring that they will provide lasting benefits. If a donor's designated charity ceases to exist, the Trust will preserve the donor's intentions by directing the funds to a similar purpose. The Trust is a flexible tool that can handle gifts in many forms. Moreover, Trust supporters can take full advantage of the tax benefits available to donors.
