The Mount Vernon/ Knox County Community Trust, having been created to receive and accept property and contributions to be administered for charitable purposes benefiting Mount Vernon and Knox County, Ohio, shall be operated so as to fulfill the following mission: Improving... the quality of life in Mount Vernon and Knox County through charitable giving. Providing... a vehicle for donors with varied interests to support charitable and community activities. Assessing... and responding to emerging and changing community needs in the fields of education, youth services, recreation, arts and culture, social services, and civic and community development. Developing... a permanent endowment for the community. Serving... as a catalyst to initiate projects vital to the community.

We are proud to present the 1997 report of the Mount Vernon/Knox County Community Trust.

Total assets of the Trust at the end of the year were \$13,120,332, a 5.0% increase over last year end.


Twenty-two donors established new funds or contributed to existing funds for a total of \$270,078.

The mission of the Community Trust is to develop a pool of funds to generate income to benefit the people and communities of Knox County. The Distribution Committee is responsible for evaluating the requests for grants, and to challenge the communities to improve their quality of life.


This past year, grants from the Unrestricted Funds totaled \$197,480, distributions from our Designated Funds were \$213,509, and scholarship grants were \$169,966, for a grand total of \$580,955. Donor-advised funds distributed totaled \$14,400. The Trust distributed a grand total of \$595,355 in 1997 to benefit our community and the charitable organizations that make our community a better place in which to live.

A ten-year review of grants and distributions emphasizes the magnitude of the Community Trust's impact on our communities. Grants for community projects over the last ten years totaled \$2,151,212. Distributions from Designated Funds totaled \$2,390,880, and scholarship grants equaled \$1,772,484. A grand total of \$6,314,576 was distributed over this period by the Trust to help people improve the quality of life in Mount Vernon and Knox County.

We truly owe a debt of gratitude to the organizers and early contributors in 1944 who brought this magnificent community asset to fruition. The source of growth of the Community Trust today comes both from contributions by generous and thoughtful citizens and the investment expertise of our Trustee bank.

There are three broad categories of funds within the Community Trust:

- 1) Unrestricted The income from the unrestricted funds is disbursed by the Distribution Committee, after detailed evaluation, to support local charitable and community-based service projects.
- **2)Designated** Income from the designated funds is disbursed as the Trustee is directed by the donors at the time the principal is contributed to the Trust.
- 3)Donor-Advised Income and/or principal from these funds is disbursed over time at the direction of the donor.

The Trust was initially founded with the goal to improve our communities. Our founders provided a central organization to accomplish this endeavor. The founders were generous contributors to the Trust, but realized continued support would be necessary for the Trust to achieve its goal. Consequently, a part of the mission of the Trust is the encouragement of individual and corporate philanthropy. Fortunately, we have been blessed with many additional contributors to the Trust over the past fifty-three years.

We encourage individuals and companies to recognize the value of the Trust to the community and utilize the Trust for their philanthropic activity. In addition to the personal satisfaction of giving, there are many programs which provide tax benefits to the contributor.

Undoubtedly, the most significant philanthropic area of the Trust has been the scholarship funds. Recognizing the importance of education and the escalating costs of higher education, the Distribution Committee has energetically pursued a program to expand the number and amount of schol-

arship grants. In the past ten years, your Community Trust has granted \$1,772,484 in scholarships to 978 Knox County Students.

While we take great pride in these imposing figures, we must be mindful of why it has happened. Scholarship grants from the Trust are possible because of the generosity and thoughtfulness of the donors. We hope the recipients and their parents express appreciation, not to the committee, but to others who may someday establish a fund to help more young people acquire a much needed higher education.

Grants from the Trust vary from \$250,000 for the YMCA Sport Center to \$250 for the refurbishing of the historic Dan Emmett birth place. Grants from the unrestricted funds of the Trust are frequently made on a matching basis. The philosophy of these grants is to encourage or challenge the grantee to obtain other contributions for its project. Many times that contribution is a gift of labor or materials to build or improve a facility for the community.

Every project supported by the Trust is intended to improve our community and/or the quality of life in our community. Since the founding of the Community Trust in 1944, the Trust has played a leadership or key role in many of the significant projects in our community. The Community Pool, Kenyon College, Mount Vernon City Hall, Knox County Airport, Mount Vernon Nazarene College, YMCA, Salvation Army, Hospice, and the Public Library of Mount Vernon and Knox County have all benefited from awards made by the Trust.

Our years of support for tree planting and gardens played a major role in the downtown beautification which resulted in Mount Vernon being named "Ohio's Most Livable City."

All of these wonderful things are the result of gifts, large and small, from the caring people who wanted to maintain and enhance the quality of life for our community.

While the Committee approves many meaningful grants to meet the needs of the community, the ability of the Trust to make substantial grants

for community facilities is most significant. This past year, the Trust completed the final payment of the \$250,000 pledge for the YMCA Sports Center (a facility that serves over 4,800 Knox County boys and girls), distributed the final payment of its \$150,000 grant to the Mount Vernon Nazarene College for the Library building, and paid the second installment on its \$100,000 pledge for the computerization of the Public Library.

Grants from the Trust frequently make the difference between success or failure for community projects. We believe it is important to continue recognition of the individuals who have established funds to benefit our community. It is our objective to preserve the memory of these benevolent and caring people.

The first grant by the Trust in 1945 was a grant of \$6,000 to establish a "City Planning Fund." Since that time, the Trust has continued to support projects to develop and execute those plans, especially those relating to parks, playgrounds, and the preservation of the environment.

The Trust continues to support planning projects for our community. Focus 2100, the current planning project sponsored by the Mount Vernon Area Chamber of Commerce, has been eminently successful. A gratifying element of its study has been the significant individual participation in this comprehensive analysis of community needs.

With regret and appreciation we report that Kenneth W. Stevenson has resigned his position on the Distribution Committee of the Community Trust. He has served seven and one-half years. He is an engineer by profession and has been employed by Cooper Bessemer Company and its successors for forty-six years. He brought to the Trust his analytical mind as well as an excellent memory and knowledge of the local area. He considered the Community Trust to be an important community asset. In the future, he will be spending more time away from Mount Vernon. We wish him the best of luck in all his new endeavors. Mr. Mark R. Ramser, President of Ohio Cumberland Gas Company, has been appointed to fill this vacancy.

On December 31, William A. Stroud completed his second and maximum term appointment. Commencing January 1, 1998, that vacancy is filled by Mr. L. Bruce Levering. Mr. Levering is President of Levering Management Inc.

William A. Stroud Retires



William A. Stroud retired from the Mount Vernon/Knox County Community Trust December 31, 1997, after spending the past ten years serving as chairman on the Distribution Committee. His guidance of the Trust during these years was invaluable, and he was a tireless promoter of the value of having a strong community trust to support projects that might have difficulty finding funding from conventional sources, yet would improve the quality of life in the county. Indeed, one of the most important movements during Mr. Stroud's tenure was outreach to the communities in the county other than Mount Vernon. Mr. Stroud likely has the deepest knowledge of the Community Trust of any living person due to his long association with it. In addition to the past ten years of direct service, he also attended the meetings of the Community Trust since his arrival in Mount Vernon in 1967 as the President, and later Chairman, of The First-Knox National Bank, the trustee for the Trust. He is proud of the impact the Community Trust has made in the county and will discuss its projects with anyone. This past year, Bill provided initial funding committed to improving our park and recreational facilities, an area in which he has always had a special interest.

We thank you, Bill, for your unswerving optimism in Knox County and its residents; that tomorrow will be a better day than today, and with the help of the community, the Community Trust will continue its critical role in this improvement.

Spotlight on Philanthropy



Education was very important to Helen Hope Cooke. After being raised in Fredericktown, she attended and graduated from both Ohio University and Columbia University. Knowing the value of education, she spent much of the rest of her life educating youth in Greenwich, Connecticut and Beirut, Lebanon. After retiring from teaching and moving to Mount Vernon, she continued to extend her personal education by traveling with her sister in many parts of the country, having already taken trips to areas of Africa and China. She also joined the First Congregational United Church of Christ in Mount Vernon and enjoyed her personal journey of deeper religious understanding during her years of attendance.

Helen died in 1994, and the assets from her trust at First-Knox National Bank were transferred into two separate funds in the Mount Vernon/Knox County Community Trust. One part, now worth over \$640,000, was set aside to help others in the path of knowledge. She directed that the income from this fund be used to provide scholarships to students graduating from the high school in Fredericktown, Ohio, her hometown. This fund provided over \$35,000 in scholarships to twenty-eight students in 1997, and will continue to support this very important interest to her. The other portion of her trust, also over \$640,000, created a fund for the First Congregational United Church of Christ. The income from this fund provides support to many of the projects at the church and keeps her presence within the congregation.

Education and her church were two important aspects of Helen's life. Through these gifts she will provide perpetual support for them and improve the quality of life for all Knox County residents.

Grants from Unrestricted Funds – \$197,480

These funds are the most responsive to changing needs in the community. These funds permit the Trust to meet urgent community needs through a high degree of flexibility. Income is distributed for local purposes and projects where the needs are the greatest as determined by the Distribution Committee.

Grants from Designated Funds – \$213,509

Designated distributions are made according to written instructions at the time the gift is made. Grants from Designated funds reflect the charitable interests of donors and provide needed operating support to diverse charitable organizations. These funds represent a permanent memorial to the donor.

During 1997, the Trust distributed 63 grants totaling \$213,509.

These financial statements are the responsibility of the Trust's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Mount Vernon Community Trust as of December 31, 1997 and 1996 and the receipts and disbursements of the Trust - cash basis for the years then ended in conformity with the cash basis of accounting, as described in Note A.

As described in Note A, the Trust accrued certain expenses in 1996, totalling \$50,000. If the expenses had not been recorded, the fund balance of the general fund would be increased by \$50,000 for the year ended December 31, 1996.

An Endowment for All

What is the Community Trust?

The Trust is a community foundation—a nonprofit organization that supports charitable endeavors and worthy projects within a particular geographical area. In the case of the Trust, that area embraces all of Knox County, Ohio. Founded in 1944, the Trust has assets of more than \$13 million. These funds, donated by many individuals and families over the years, function as a community endowment—the principal is invested and protected; only the income is used.

What is the mission of the Trust?

The Trust seeks, broadly, to improve the quality of life in Knox County. It does this by giving grants to support projects in fields such as education, health, recreation, community planning and development, social services, culture, and the arts.

How does the Trust work?

A Distribution Committee consisting of five Knox County residents oversees the disbursement of grants. The Committee ensures that funds are used in accordance with the wishes of donors. In the case of "unrestricted" funds—those for which donors did not specify a purpose, the Committee makes grants based on community needs. Thus, the Trust functions in two ways; it serves as a vehicle through which donors can support the charitable causes of their choice and, it serves as a permanent, general endowment for Mount Vernon and Knox County.

What kinds of grants does the Trust give?

The Trust administers a substantial college scholarship program. Other grants support building funds, capital campaigns, and equipment purchases. The Trust also provides matching or challenge grants as well as seed money for charitable groups. Annual contributions are made to specific charities from funds designated by donors for that purpose. Occasionally, the Trust also coordinates fundraising drives for special community projects.

Who benefits from the Trust?

Dozens of community organizations have received support from the Trust. They include; the YMCA, the Public Library of Mount Vernon and Knox County, the city and county school systems, various recreational facilities in the county, the City of Mount Vernon, Moundbuilders Guidance Center, Station Break Senior Citizens' Center, Salvation Army, Interchurch Social Services, Hospice of Knox County, Knox County Airport, Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Kenyon College, Mount Vernon Nazarene College, Memorial Building Theater, Knox County Agricultural Museum, and the Knox County Historical Museum. Through its grants to organizations like these, and through its scholarship program, the Community Trust touches the lives of thousands of residents throughout Knox County.

Why do people give to the Trust?

The Trust offers people an opportunity to contribute to the well-being of their community. Moreover, in giving through the Trust, donors know that their gifts will benefit future generations, because the Trust spends only the income from its investments. The original gifts are safeguarded. A gift to the Trust is thus a way of perpetuating one's own memory in the community or provides a lasting memorial for someone

How does somebody make a gift to the Trust?

Many donors include a bequest to the Trust in their wills, while some make contributions during their lifetime. Gifts can take the form of securities, real property, or other assets as cash. Donors may make designated gifts, specifying that the money benefit a particular organization or field of interest; or unrestricted gifts, which are used to meet a wide variety of community needs.

What are the practical advantages of giving to the Trust?

The Trust professionally and prudently manages all gifts, with the goal of ensuring that they will provide lasting benefits. If a donor's designated charity ceases to exist, the Trust will preserve the donor's intentions by directing the funds to a similar purpose. The Trust is a flexible tool that can handle gifts in many forms. Moreover, Trust supporters can take full advantage of the tax benefits available to donors.
